- Setting up a meeting and Cleaning up after a meeting
- Greeter.
- Leading a meeting.
- Serve as secretary, treasurer, literature person, etc.
- Attending District & Area or Intergroup meetings for your group by becoming a GSR or Intergroup Representative.

Other activities in the service of other alcoholics may include:

- Welcoming newcomers.
- Sponsorship.
- Helping with events: workshops, speakers meetings, conferences, conventions and assemblies, picnics, and more.
- Answering calls for our local Intergroup hotline.
- Joining a service committee.
- Take meetings into a correctional or treatment facility.
- Contributing to the local AA newsletter.
- Volunteering for 12th Step calls that come in to the Central Office.
- Speaking before professional groups (doctors, clergy, nurses, etc.) with the CPC/PI committee.
